Forsaken for Our Sake Mark 15:16-41 Series: Getting In on the Good News The Gospel of Jesus Christ According to Mark

Mark 15:33–39 (NIV) — 33 At noon, darkness came over the whole land until three in the afternoon. 34 And at three in the afternoon Jesus cried out in a loud voice, "Eloi, Eloi, lema sabachthani?" (which means "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?"). 35 When some of those standing near heard this, they said, "Listen, he's calling Elijah." 36 Someone ran, filled a sponge with wine vinegar, put it on a staff, and offered it to Jesus to drink. "Now leave him alone. Let's see if Elijah comes to take him down," he said. 37 With a loud cry, Jesus breathed his last. 38 The curtain of the temple was torn in two from top to bottom. 39 And when the centurion, who stood there in front of Jesus, saw how he died, he said, "Surely this man was the Son of God!"

Central Thought: We get in on the Good News when we see in the brutal, humiliating crucifixion of Jesus – forsaken by God and men – the clearest expression of God's character, the depth of his love for his creation and his solidarity with the oppressed and the forsaken.

The Cross of Jesus...

✤ Reveals what God is really like.

Hebrews 1:3 (NIV) — *3 The Son is the radiance of God's glory and the exact representation of his being*... (See also Colossians 1:19)

Demonstrates the depths of his love.

John 3:16–17 (NIV) — 16 For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life. 17 For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but to save the world through him.

• In giving his son, God gave us himself!

2 Corinthians 5:18–19 (NLT) — 18 And all of this is a gift from God, who brought us back to himself through Christ. And God has given us this task of reconciling people to him. 19 For God was in Christ, reconciling the world to himself, no longer counting people's sins against them. And he gave us this wonderful message of reconciliation.

John 14:10–11 (NIV) — 10 Don't you believe that I am in the Father, and that the Father is in me? The words I say to you I do not speak on my own authority. Rather, it is the Father, living in me, who is doing his work. 11 Believe me when I say that I am in the Father and the Father is in me; or at least believe on the evidence of the works themselves.

✤ Communicates God's solidarity with the oppressed, the persecuted and the abandoned.

Isaiah 53:3 (NIV) — 3 He was despised and rejected by mankind, a man of suffering, and familiar with pain. Like one from whom people hide their faces he was despised, and we held him in low esteem.

• God has an experiential understanding of your pain!

Hebrews 4:14–16 (NLT) — 14 So then, since we have a great High Priest who has entered heaven, Jesus the Son of God, let us hold firmly to what we believe. 15 This High Priest of ours understands our weaknesses, for he faced all of the same testings we do, yet he did not sin. 16 So let us come boldly to the throne of our gracious God. There we will receive his mercy, and we will find grace to help us when we need it most.

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
